Part 2 - Trustees' Annual report

Structure Government and Management. The Trust is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation governed by a Constitution dated 25 June 2013. Membership of the Trust is open to any individual aged 16 or over who is resident in the area covered by the Community Councils of Royal Burgh of Lochmaben & District, Templand & District and Royal Four Towns. Interested individuals resident outwith these areas can be admitted to membership but are unable to vote. There are currently 380 members. A minimum of 3 and a maximum of 10 Board Members/Charity Trustees are elected at each AGM. All of the Trustees must retire at each AGM but are eligible for re-election. Since 24 February 2014 a part time Project Manager, Darren Flint, has been in post.

At the AGM held in March 2019 warm tribute was paid to David Rose on his retirement from the Board. David had been instrumental in securing the community purchase of Castle Loch and had devoted considerable time and professional skill in Chairing the Board since its inception. Howard Baisden was elected to succeed David as

Objectives and Activities. The Trust's purposes as laid out in the Constitution are:

- To advance environmental protection and improvement and
- To advance citizenship or community development through community ownership and management of Castle Loch, Lochmaben.

In pursuance of these objectives a dedicated team of volunteers has been established who regularly carry out a range of tasks around the Loch. Children's and youth groups have been encouraged to utilise the facilities and appreciate the importance of caring for this important environment. A large and growing number of members of the

community of all ages access the path round the Loch and this inspired more people to become engaged in the management and protection of the area.

Achievements and Performance. Volunteering: The big news was the announcement on the 6th June 2018 that the volunteers had received the Queen's Award for Voluntary Services – the OBE of volunteering. This was in recognition of their commitment and hard work over the 5 years since the community buyout. During the last year just over 1000 hours were donated at the twice monthly work parties, plus adhoc events help and weather-related incidents. As well as the continued maintenance across the whole site work was begun on creating a footpath in the recently purchased Kirkhirst Woodland.

Loch Users and Facilities: An opportunity arose to purchase Kirkhirst woodland, adjacent to the grassland, at the southern end of the loch. This will enable the community to extend the nature reserve, restore the broadleaf woodland and move the path away from an often-muddy track. The purchase was funded by the Scottish Land Fund and works to improve the habitat and create a new path/play area are funded by ANCBC, Magnox and Tesco Bags of Help.

The loch continues to have a wide range of users of all ages and interests, including sailing, fishing, wildlife enthusiasts, walkers, and joggers. Walking continues to be extremely popular with 18,158 undertaking the full 3-mile circuit of the loch during the year as recorded on the people counter, an average of 1513 per month (+1.3% on 2017/18).

Community Engagement: The Trust undertakes regular activities with a range of local groups and educational facilities, both on site and remotely including school visits, sponsored walks and partnership working with other local projects eg release of the River Annan Trust Eels. The largest event of the year was a two-week archaeological dig at Lochmaben Castle led by Historic Environment Scotland at the end of July/early August, where some 500 people attended organised events, ad hoc visits or helped in the trenches. This also generated much publicity in local/national press and TV. Local business supported in the last year included GLS Fencing, Robison Construction, Graham's Bakery and Pink Flamingo (event catering).

Habitat Management: Invasive/unwanted plants such as American skunk cabbage, Himalayan balsam and rhododendron were cleared. Local ecologists, botanists and bryophyte experts/enthusiasts continued to survey the grassland and woodlands recording birds, moths, flora, and mosses species. The Trust continues to take an approach of minimal intervention and allowing the habitats to develop and regenerate naturally, focusing any works on safety around the footpaths

Future Plans. The purchase of Kirkhirst Plantation will allow us to achieve the objective of diverting part of the footpath away from the part which is shared with farm traffic and which is difficult and costly to maintain. The plantation will also require a safety fence to be installed along the line of the A709 classified road. Further work will involve removal of the large areas of rhododendrons, installation of bridges, creation of footpaths and the creation of a safe play area for children. In the light of the substantial workload securing funding for the continued employment of the Project Officer remains a high priority.

Financial performance. Receipts during the year exceeded payments by £4,653 resulting in reserves increasing by this amount to £35,790. Most of the reserve is restricted and will be utilised for projects during the remainder of 2019. It is the Board's policy to try to maintain an unrestricted reserve of around £10k in order to meet unforeseen expenditure. The Board expresses its sincere thanks to all funders including local residents who participate in regular giving schemes or make one off donations.

The post of Project Officer is funded for two days per week until 31 December 2019 and for one day per week for 2020. The Board is endeavouring to find funding for a second day in 2020 and if possible to continue the post in future years.
